It supports our researchers in assuring the ethical conduct of research and compliance with federal, state and institutional regulations and provides a professional office staff to assist both investigators, participants, and five Institutional Review Boards (IRBs). The Association for Accreditation of Human Research Protection Programs (AAHRPP) has awarded full accreditation to the program.
- Current focus is the integration of other Mount Sinai Health System IRB's into the PPHS, establishing uniform application and review throughout the system and eliminating the need for multiple applications for multi-site projects within this health system, rolling out IDEATE as the software platform for PPHS submissions, and developing the structure to support a new role as the single IRB for multi-site projects funded by NIH and others.

- The Queens Health Network of the New York City Health and Hospitals Corporation was composed of Elmhurst and Queens Hospital Centers. (The network is currently reverting back into 2 facilities as part of the NYC H+H reorganization plan.) The Network included over 800 acute care inpatient beds, extensive primary care and specialty outpatient and community based services, a Level 1 Trauma Center, and comprehensive mental health and chemical dependency services. As an affiliate of Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai School of Medicine, the Network had over 40 residency training programs and was a medical student site. The Network was the safety net public system for the 2 million residents of Queens.

RESEARCH PROFILE:

Publications include papers from lab and clinical trials. The personality papers represent an early effort to apply mathematical rigor in a theoretical agnostic model to identify the core traits of personality disorders and to streamline diagnosis. It foreshadows some of the progress in identifying cross cutting features of these disorders that is a focus of development in DSM5 and the current Research Domain Criteria (RDoC) methodology adopted by the NIH. The microbial continuous culture work I did as an undergraduate led to the development of the novel pHaustostat, and the paper is still cited today. While never published, my frontline work in the ED allowed me to identify key clinical features of crack cocaine intoxication and abuse and develop treatment approaches that I lectured on extensively during the epidemic that swept our area in the mid-1980s.

My activities in support of the Research enterprise are more extensive. There is the obvious support provided during my years of service at the IRB/PPHS. There is also my service on the local research review committees at Elmhurst and Queens Hospitals. Less obvious is the extensive work with NYC Health + Hospitals to revise and update their research policies, promote collaborative research, and to an extent, make for a more receptive environment for collaboration with the medical school. My activities to support the building of a successful statewide health information exchange and a single-payer database will ultimately yield significant dividends to researchers, especially around population health and medical economics.

CLINICAL PROFILE:

At the beginning of my career I ran the psychiatric emergency service at Queens Hospital. I was the attending of record for thousands of acutely ill persons and supervised scores of residents and students. While developing extensive expertise in management of psychiatric emergencies and being involved in delivery system development, e.g. Comprehensive Psychiatric Emergency

Programs (CPEP), I also developed particular expertise in the acute treatment of cocaine intoxication and abuse with the opportunity to spread this expertise in local and international presentations.

It was at that time that I established a part time solo private practice in the middle of Queens. It was a pleasure to treat patients who came voluntarily and wanted to see me and was a nice contrast to my ER day job. I have maintained a two-evenings-a-week practice ever since. I have a good working collaboration with internists and specialists in the area and have “unwittingly” been involved in integrated care for decades. My reputation is such that I have been frequently called upon to provide second consultations at the behest of patients and clinicians, especially throughout Queens and Nassau counties.

My clinical experience has also been enhanced by the years of running the department of psychiatry where I was extensively involved in QA/PI activities, successful efforts to reduce length of stay and readmissions and helped introduce LEAN methodology to the department, and support it later throughout the Queens Health Network in my position of CMIO.

IMPACT

For over thirty years I have been involved in direct patient care, teaching, clinical supervision and administration. These activities have been at the city and state level and for the last 5 or so years nationally, especially through my involvement in the American Psychiatric Association. My direct impact on psychiatric care and the adaption of health information technology within Queens and throughout the extensive public hospital system in NYC is detailed throughout this document.

My involvement in the various state committees, outlined under Administrative Leadership Appointments, has allowed me to effect change not just within psychiatry but throughout the state’s health care delivery system. During my tenure, the Certificate of Need process has become less burdensome, the integration of mental health services within the provision of “general” medical care has advanced, regulatory efforts to respond to global warming by improving the healthcare infrastructure standards within the state have commenced, and statewide clinical health information exchange has taken off. This progress has been the result of collaboration and team effort, and my contributions have been public and not inconsequential.

I have held leadership positions at all levels of professional psychiatric associations and most recently I have been on the APA’s Board of Trustees and was Speaker of the Assembly of our almost 40,000-member organization. I was actively involved in the key final scientific reviews and decision making that allowed the DSM5 to be completed. I was the key figure in assuring approval for the document by the Assembly prior to the Board. While far from perfect the DSM still has immense international impact on the field of psychiatry. I am still on the steering committee for DSM which oversees the ongoing process of corrections, revisions and amendments. I am also involved in the establishment of our nationwide clinical registry which will benefit the nation’s psychiatrists by allowing them to participate in various fiscally impactful quality reporting initiatives, and which will eventually become an invaluable research resource.

New York eHealth Collaborative (NYeC) 2006-present

- Founded in 2006 by healthcare leaders, in partnership with the New York State Department of Health, the New York eHealth Collaborative receives funding from state and federal grants to serve as the focal point for health IT in the State of New York. NYeC's mission is to develop policies and standards, assist healthcare providers in making the shift to electronic health records, and coordinate the creation of a network to connect healthcare providers statewide. The New York State Department of Health has appointed NYeC to be the state-designated entity for the SHIN-NY, an innovative "network of networks" that interconnects New York's eight regional health information organizations (Qualified Entities).

I provide subject matter expertise in Mental Health, IT, RHIOs, HIPAA and research that has impacted the development of privacy and security policies and procedures that serve to protect the patient's health information that is exchanged via the Statewide Health Information Network for New York (SHIN-NY). I have been instrumental in working through the legal, regulatory and ethical issues surrounding research uses of the data held by and passing through the SHIN-NY. Participating since the first workgroups for over 8 years, my mental health experience and knowledge have specifically influenced the development and adoption of these statewide policies.

NYS Department of Health Public Health and Health Planning Council (PHHPC) Member 2011-present

- The Public Health and Health Planning Council (PHHPC) has a broad array of advisory and decision-making responsibilities with respect to New York State's public health and health care delivery

system. It is charged with adopting and amending the Sanitary Code and health care facility, home care agency, and hospice operating regulations. The PHHPC also makes decisions concerning the establishment and transfer of ownership of health care facilities, home care agencies and hospice programs. It makes recommendations to the Commissioner of Health concerning major construction projects, service changes, and equipment acquisitions in health care facilities and home care agencies. It also advises the Commissioner on issues related to the preservation and improvement of public health. The Council's powers and duties are set forth in section 225 of the Public Health Law. Appointments are made by the governor and require New York State Confirmation. Two members are appointed to both the PPHC and the Behavioral Health Advisory Council to facilitate the integration of mental health, substance abuse and "physical" medicine to provide more effective and efficient health care delivery and prevention services in the state.

The Committee will also handle matters that were considered under the SHPRC's Information Systems Review Committee whose general purpose was to advance a framework for CON to ensure interoperable health information technology is an underpinning to health care delivery and supports health care stakeholders. Advise the DOH on health information policy relevant to health care stakeholders.

 - The mission of this committee was to examine the current building, construction and physical plant codes for health care facilities in the wake of extreme weather experienced recently with Hurricanes Irene and Lee and Superstorm Sandy. - **Ad Hoc Advisory Committee on Freestanding ASCs and Charity Care** Member 2012
 - The Committee was formed to examine the factors affecting the level of charity care being provided by freestanding ambulatory surgery centers (ASCs), including those that cause some ASC operators to fall significantly short of their charity care targets. The Committee was to consider alternatives to the direct provision of charity care by freestanding ASCs which may nevertheless expand access to services by uninsured clients and others dependent on uncompensated care. NYS Department of Health Medicaid Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee

- The multidisciplinary committee reviewed the therapeutic classes subject to the Preferred Drug Program, advised the commissioner of health as to the choice of preferred drugs, provided oversight of the clinical drug review program, and collaborated with the Drug Utilization Review Board to promote safe cost-effective use of medications. Given statutory changes as a result of the 2013 – 2014 Executive Budget the Pharmacy & Therapeutics (P&T) Committee was dissolved effective April 1, 2013 and its functions have been transitioned to the Drug Utilization Review (DUR) Board.

NYS Office and Mental Health and Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Behavioral Health Services Advisory Council Member 2013-present

- The BHSAC shall advise Office of Mental Health and the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services on matters relating to the provision of behavioral health services; issues of joint concern to the offices, including the integration of various behavioral health services and the integration of behavioral health services with health services; and issues related to the delivery of behavioral health services that are responsive to local, state and federal concerns. The council has been actively involved in streamlining licensure requirements and other regulations to avoid duplicative applications and certifications that have historically complicated care delivery and access in NYS and have increased costs to providers and government. Many of these changes are already implemented and are key to successful Medicaid reform as envisioned in the DSRIP implementation.

 - The Project Review Committee reviews Prior Approval Review (PAR) applications for consistency with criteria specified in PAR regulations and advises the full BHSAC of Committee findings on individual project. The full BHSAC acts on the Committee's report, the results of which are forwarded as recommendations to the Commissioner with jurisdiction of the project.
